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# 2026 assessments explained; new fines adopted

It's time once again to review our annual expenses and determine each lot owner's fair share assessment. For 2026, the assessment will be \$184, just \$1 increase per month. This adjustment is primarily due to a significant rise in insurance premiums, largely influenced by the California wildfires. Our breakeven budget is posted on our website. As a reminder, you can obtain copies of the board meeting minutes, fines schedules, collection policies, and the budget on our website (<https://tpuoa.net>) or by asking the office staff.

## FINANCIAL FOOTNOTES

To help manage costs, we've introduced an electronic invoice system and offer online payment options for added convenience. Invoices will be emailed to owners who have opted-in to digital communications. If we don't have your email or you've opted out, your invoice will be mailed. Assessments are due on receipt and must be paid by January 31.

Each homeowner's contribution supports vital services that benefit

our entire community, including: security personnel to help deter and investigate illegal activity; compliance staff who uphold property standards, protecting home values; office staff who assist with deed transfers and 55+ certification, which may qualify you for insurance discounts; coordination with TPE to ensure recreational facilities remain accessible and well-maintained; and, support for the Happenings magazine, keeping residents informed and connected.

The Board takes its collection responsibilities seriously. Currently, 4.4% of our owners are involved in lien procedures. We hope to reduce this number to zero

through continued outreach and support.

We're also updating our compliance policy and fines schedule to reflect AB130, which limits fines for Common Interest Developments (CIDs). However, our legal counsel has confirmed that TPUOA is not classified as a CID under California law, as we do not own or maintain common areas for member use. Recreational facilities are managed by Kort & Scott Management Group, Inc.; therefore, our fines schedule will not follow the new California law (AB130) effective July 1, 2025.
