TPUA's "pink ballot" clarified

Dear Tri Palm Property Owner, you received two ballots: the white ballot to elect board members and the pink ballot to guide the board on an important decision.

Our community is governed by Covenants, Conditions, and Restrictions (CC&Rs). The TPUOA board's responsibilities are: 1. Ensure Property Owners comply with CC&Rs; 2. Maintain our 55+ Senior Community status; and 3. Keep our neighborhood safe and healthy.

The pink ballot asks if the CC&Rs should be changed so property owners pay the cost of fixing their own violations. Currently, if a Property Owner is not compliant, the board

investigates, contacts them, and works toward compliance through letters, conversations, and fines.

If the Property Owner still refuses, the board has two expensive options:

1. Hire someone to correct the violation, or 2. Involve an attorney. Right now, these costs are covered by everyone's annual dues.

A YES vote means the board can charge the noncompliant Property Owner for expenses such as legal costs. A NO vote means all Property Owners share the cost, which could result in a special assessment in 2026.

This decision impacts all of us. Please vote and let us know your preference.

Senior Housing Spotlight: Living in a 55+ Community: Essential Information

What are the Restrictions?
55+ communities are neighborhoods designed for adults aged 55 and older. To maintain a peaceful and comfortable environment, there are important rules to follow. The main rule is the age requirement: children under 18 or individuals under 55 cannot live in the community full-time, but they may visit for short stays.

There are two exceptions to the age requirement, a full-time caregiver, and a qualified permanent resident. A full-time caregiver must have a doctor's certification that the resident requires substantial 24/7 care. Substantial care is defined as a person needing substantial assistance with walking, dressing, meal preparation/eating, and help getting in and out of bed or a chair, and with personal hygiene, such as bathing and toileting.

Neither the resident nor the caregiver may work outside the home.

How Are These Rules Supported? These rules are supported by the Fair Housing Act, which allows exceptions for age-restricted communities. The Senior Housing Committee ensures compliance with regulations and can impose fines as needed. Currently, 12 homes with younger residents are being monitored, and IDs are requested to verify ages. If rules aren't followed, a hearing is scheduled with

the owners. If they don't attend, the violation is referred to our attorney.

If you rent your home, you must provide the office with a rental agreement, proof of age for all residents, and identification showing each resident's date of birth. The 2026 Senior Audit will be included with the January Assessment Invoice. It must be returned to comply with senior housing laws and preserve our status as a 55+ community.

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The dynamics of stretching, before and after

Happy New Year! Wishing everyone all the best in 2026!

It's been a long tradition that at the beginning of a new year people make New Year's resolutions: Becoming more physically fit is up there on the priority list.

With any physical activity it's important to take steps to prevent injury. Pickleball has many short quick movements so warming up before play is recommended. Stretching before play prepares your body by increasing blood flow, warms your muscles, improves range of motion, enhances agility and reduces muscle tightness. This helps prevent pulled muscles, strains, sprains and shoulder pain. More flexible muscles and joints lead to quicker responses while playing.

There are 2 types of stretches: Dynamic and

Static. Dynamic stretching involves moving parts of your body through a full range of motion in a controlled manner, like arm circles, leg swings and torso twists followed by light cardio. These movements are best done before play to prepare for quick movements reducing injury risk. Static stretching is done afterwards and involves holding a stretch for 15-60 seconds to elongate and relax the muscle. These stretches improve flexibility and aid recovery. Google has many videos that can be helpful for ideas on pre- and post-game exercises.

It's always advised to check with your doctor before starting a new sporting activity especially if you have pre-existing health conditions. Get your body moving before you get your body moving on the courts.

A few minutes before and a few minutes afterwards prepare your body, and you'll be ready to enjoy the game even more!

directions to how you might find them. These visits can also be stressful to both our homeowners and staff.


The Board of Directors however will not tolerate




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

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Second Season Golf Club members earn fame, and cash

Winter golf can be very difficult...finding a white golf ball in all that snow sucks. So...let's have some fun at Tri Palms Second Season Golf Club.

Our first tournament of the season was our 2025 Kickoff Mixer. This 4 man, 2 best net balls, team event paid \$400 to the team of Yong Yun, Bill Campbell, Noel Hay, and Terry Ramsey.

Next was the always exciting and complicated Calcutta Classic, this was a 4-man scramble using a minimum of three drives from each player including a compulsory drive from each player on one of the par 3's. 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HOA dues increases explained

We recently got a great question from a homeowner: "Why did the HOA fee go up to \$184, and who decided that?" Thanks for asking! Here's the scoop.

Your HOA board approved the \$12 increase. Nine community-elected homeowners sit on the board.

Rising costs are the main reason. Property insurance jumped this year because of wildfire risks in California, adding about \$5 per home. Plus, most vendors apply cost-of-living increases each year.

FINANCIAL FOOTNOTES

When we plan the budget, our goal is simple: cover expenses without leaving any extra funds. We divide the total expenses equally among the 1,600 homeowners.

Future increases? Hard to predict, but our bylaws (section 9.3.1) cap annual dues at 20% unless in an emergency. You can check out the full 2026 budget on our website TPUOA.NET.

Invoices will go out on January 1, 2026, and will include the required senior

housing audit form.

Please complete the form and submit payment in January. We sincerely hope everyone will take

advantage of the easy payment process when receiving your invoice by email.
